## Te Mana Raupō

### What is a Kāhui Ako ?

A Community of Learning, or Kāhui Ako, is a group of education and training providers (early learning, schools, kura) working together to help students achieve their full potential.

### What does our name Te Mana Raupō mean ?

Initially our name was simply The South Christchurch Community of Learning. After consultation with Mātauraka Mahaanui (Waitaha Advisory Board) on behalf of Ngāi Tahu, our Community of Learning adopted the name "Te Mana Raupō" (as from 31st May 2017). This translates to "The Prestigious Raupō". The Raupō (tall green wetlands plant) was abundant along the Heathcote River and Lyttleton Harbour, and used to make small waka used to travel from Banks Peninsula and up the Heathcote River.

### How was Te Mana Raupō formed ?

In 2016 there were a number of meetings amongst our local schools and Early Childhood Education (ECEs) childhood centres to scope out the possibility of establishing ourselves into a Community of Learning – based on the National-led Government's Investing in Education Success (IES) programme which was launched back in 2015. At the beginning of 2017 we had seven schools and 20 ECEs committed to work together to form a Community of Learning during that year. Through 2017 two Lead Principals were appointed for six months each: Mark Wilson (Cashmere High School's Principal) and then Rob Callaghan (St Martins' School Principal); and our Achievement Challenge Plan was successfully developed and submitted in July to the Ministry of Education for approval. The endorsement from the Minister was gained on 11th September 2017.

The four Across School Lead Teachers had job descriptions and details developed, and then appointed in October 2017. The seven schools then began their process of appointing their Within School Teachers. We generated an entitlement of 23 Within School Teacher positions, with Cashmere High School having 12 to appoint and each of the six primary schools between 1 and 3. By early Term 1 2018 all the schools had successfully appointed their Within School Teachers. The Lead Principal role was renewed by the Stewardship Group to Rob Callaghan (St Martins' School Principal) and then Mark Wilson (Cashmere High School's Principal) for a further six months each. At this stage the title of Community of Learning became more commonly referred to by the Māori title of Kāhui Ako.

### What are our Achievement Challenges ?

In 2017 we collectively agreed to set ourselves five Achievement Challenges, which have been endorsed by the Minister. These five Achievement Challenges are:

1. The challenge is that a significant number of ākonga do not transition from ECEs into school well. Te Mana Raupō want to support continuity of learning by creating positive pathways to school or kura.
2. Our challenge is to accelerate student achievement in Writing.
3. Our challenge is to accelerate student achievement in Mathematics from Years 1 to 8.
4. To raise the achievement across all strands of the Mathematics curriculum for students in Year 10.
5. To lift male achievement in NCEA with a focus on subject-specific Literacy Skills across the curriculum.

These Achievement Challenges are likely to be reviewed and amended over the coming years, as our Kāhui Ako may choose to shift the focus onto other curriculum areas and learning needs.

## What are the key staff roles within our Kāhui Ako?

### Our Stewardship Group:

This is a governance group, responsible for oversight and strategic planning for our Kāhui Ako. Its membership is made up of representatives from the seven schools, as well as four ECE representatives, and two regional Ministry of Education staff sit in attendance. This Group meets about six times a year.

### Our Lead Principals:

The Lead Principal role has been shared over the last two years (2017-18) between Rob Callaghan (St Martins' School Principal) and Mark Wilson (Cashmere High School's Principal). Over this time the focus has been on establishing our Kāhui Ako, including our Achievement Challenge plan, appointing people to key roles, securing some external resourcing for support, and beginning the process of collaboration between schools and ECEs to improve outcomes for our students.

### Our new "Dual Lead Principals":

At the end of 2018 we gained approval from the Secretary of Education for an alternative leadership arrangement, in order for us to appoint two people to concurrently share the Lead Principals position. We have appointed Sally Ormandy (Ōpawa School Principal) and Averil Worner (St Mark's School Principal), and they will commence this role as from 1st April 2019.

### Our four Across School Teachers (AST):

Initially we appointed four Across School Teachers from 2017-18. These roles were reviewed and changes made at the end of 2018. To these new roles we have appointed the following people:



**Felicity Morton-Turner - ECE transitions AST (Waltham School)** The key focus of this role is to lead the collaborative process of defining and identifying "successful transition" from ECEs to schooling, and the implementation of effective systems to best support successful transition. **Shaun Edwards-Brown - Wellbeing AST (Cashmere High School)** The key focus of this role is to lead the collaborate development and sharing of best teaching and learning practice in the curriculum area of wellbeing across and within the schools. **Grant Ritchie - Maths AST (Cashmere High School)** The key focus of this role is to lead the collaborate development and sharing of best teaching and learning practice in the curriculum area of mathematics across and within the schools - [rgg@cashmere.school.nz](mailto:rgg@cashmere.school.nz)



**Katrina Steans - Diverse Learners AST (St Marks School)** The key focus of this role is to lead the collaborative process of assisting in the identification of diverse learners and the implementation of educational support and strategies to best support these students - [k.steans@saintmarks.school.nz](mailto:k.steans@saintmarks.school.nz)

The intention is that these four Across School Teachers will work with the Within School Teachers and other delegated lead teachers, lead across school collaborative teacher inquiry groups, develop online means of sharing best practice, and lead hui with relevant staff on sharing practice.

### Our Within School Teachers (WST):

Within School Teachers are a Kāhui Ako resource, appointed to assist work towards the Achievement Challenges. Each school appoints their own Within School Teachers. The responsibilities of each of these Within School Teachers will vary between schools, as each school chooses how they will utilize their resources to best meet their obligations to meeting our Kāhui Ako's Achievement Challenges.

### New resourcing opportunities for ECEs:

The regional Ministry staff also indicated some new resourcing could be available to support ECEs engage in our Kāhui Ako. Successful applications were submitted in November-December 2018 for this resourcing, including a 'Joint Funded' application and also a Strengthening Early Learning Opportunity (SELO) contract with the Ministry and an external provider (e.g. CORE Education). This resourcing has been secured, and the external supports and currently being put in place to help with our Kāhui Ako's Achievement Challenge on successful transition from ECEs to primary schooling.
