Bullying - Conversation 1. Let's talk!

Bullying and antisocial behaviours is an issue for all schools. It has attracted significant media attention in recent weeks and the deleterious effects on those bullied and those who bully are well documented. Taking a proactive and preventive approach is the only course schools should take to reduce incidents at school and have clear policies and procedures for understanding and dealing with the issue transparently. The well-being of every child is the responsibility of everyone. Heightened awareness and increased empathy are key to our conversations.

Research and advice from experts indicate the only way to address bullying is support from the whole community - students, staff and parents. The first step is to accept that bullying incidents occur - at St Mark's School - and acknowledge that appropriate resources are required as part of a prevention strategy.

The second step is to acknowledge that bullying is not "just part of growing up". The Ministry of Education National Administration Guidelines (NAG 5) states that each school is to "Provide a safe physical and emotional environment for every student". Although this does not directly cover aspects of bullying, the recommendation is that developing and implementing a bullying policy will help a school ensure that it meets it's obligations in relation to providing a safe environment for all students.

The Board of Trustees of St Mark's School will be reviewing our bullying policy this term and community input is crucial. Of course you can talk with any staff member at any time.

Over the next few weeks, students will be taking part in the **Kia Kaha Program- Developed by the Youth Education Service New Zealand Police.** This is a program designed to help create safe positive classrooms in which bullying cannot flourish. It will be delivered by your child's teacher with help from **Senior Constable Ross Mitchell.** A letter for parents and caregivers will be sent to you all and include a link to an overview of the program.

All this will be framed around a document called: Bullying Prevention and Response: a Guide for Schools.

A stylised cluster of mānuka branches underlines the Bullying-free NZ brandmark, symbolising the philosophy that underpins our approach.



Whakapūpūtia mai ō mānuka, kia kore ai e whati. 'Cluster the branches of the mānuka, so they will not break.'

This whakatauki embodies the philosophy of Bullying-free NZ. "Together with a shared vision, we know which direction to go, together - we can prevent bullying in Aotearoa." Mānuka has an important role as a pioneering plant and nurturer of the forest. The growth of mānuka is the first stage towards the growth of a new native forest. It creates shade and shelter from the wind, protecting young native plants which will eventually grow into mature forests (just as together we can all help prevent bullying of our tamariki).

Schools can't prevent bullying alone. They need the support of whānau and communities to provide safe, positive learning environments for children and young people.

Our commitment? Fostering healthy social interactions with restorative practices. This is "transforming lives through the St Mark's Story" through relationships.

St Mark's Cross Country - Friday 5th May


