#### **CURRICULUM AREA: MUSIC**

Reorganising the archive room has been a delight, as many gems of the past have been found. This has included some wonderful photographs of past choirs, orchestras and other music groups. Such is the heritage!! And very easy to honour and develop for the next stage.

In 2018 we have started with a **Junior Choir (Year 4 and 5) and a Performance Choir (Years 6, 7 and 8)** under the expert tutelage of **Mr Paul Ellis.** We will be looking for opportunities to showcase this talent in church services and in our community.

A further and exciting development has been the spearheading of our Classroom Music Program delivered expertly by our Music Specialist **Ms Adrienne Hale.** Adrienne comes to the school with many years of experience in other schools, but with a christian faith to lead so sympathetically with our special character. The students have a tailor made curriculum which tracks right across the school with consistency and development of every child in mind. I joined **Miss Bryant's** class last week, playing glockenspiels and resonator bells to pre-recorded music. Many of the Year 3's were better coordinated with two beaters than I!

Our Lead Teacher in Music - Mrs Emily Wells writes:

Music is such an integral part of life at St Mark's. The singing in our weekly services is so beautiful it makes me start the day with a huge smile - and often with goosebumps! Standing outside the hall on a Wednesday or Friday morning before school is a joy - listening to the rehearsals of the Performance Choir and Year 4/5 choir.

To compliment the classroom music programme, this year we have 90 students having individual / group lessons from our talented team of Itinerant Music Teachers. They offer instruction in singing, piano, guitar, bass guitar, drums, trumpet, trombone, recorder and violin. When students have been learning for a few years, they can audition to join the school orchestra - developing the skill of playing music together as a group.

You may be aware of the nationwide crisis in recruiting and retaining teachers.

Children need teachers with enough time to teach so they can give each child the attention they deserve, and children need talented and inspiring people to be attracted to teaching.

Children are missing out on some opportunities to learn because teachers are bogged down in administration or are struggling to get enough support for children with additional learning needs.

Teachers at our school are joining an NZEI Te Riu Roa campaign, called *Kua Tae Te Wā – It's Time* to address these issues.

Our goal is to free teachers to teach, and principals to lead, by getting the additional support and staff that schools need. And we'll attract more people to teaching by respecting and paying them as the professionals they are.

NZEI Te Riu Roa members at our school have been invited to paid union meetings in March so that we can plan and discuss the campaign and their upcoming collective agreement negotiations.

The meeting schedule has been planned so that teachers and principals across the country can work out the best meetings for them to attend, including the option of groups of teachers attending meetings at different times. This is to help reduce disruption to teaching programmes, children and parents.

Our children deserve the best education in the world, and New Zealand can afford to provide it. It's just a matter of priorities.
